LOCAL FOOD SALES

What can I do to support and encourage the sales of high quality local food in my region?

- Try to purchase your food as close to its source as possible by joining a CSA or shopping at farmers markets, farm stands and cooperatives.
- Encourage stores and restaurants to source specific items locally. Instead of 'please source locally' try 'please source carrots locally' or 'please source ground beef locally.'
